

"Don't Take Your Sin Lightly"

Lamentations 1:4-9

December 20, 2020

Lev 26:14-20

- 14 'But if you do not obey Me and do not carry out all these commandments,
- 15 if, instead, you reject My statutes, and if your soul abhors My ordinances so as not to carry out all My commandments, and so break My covenant,
- 16 I, in turn, will do this to you: I will appoint over you a sudden terror, consumption and fever that will waste away the eyes and cause the soul to pine away; also, you will sow your seed uselessly, for your enemies will eat it up.
- 17 'I will set My face against you so that you will be struck down before your enemies; and those who hate you will rule over you, and you will flee when no one is pursuing you.
- 18 'If also after these things you do not obey Me, then I will punish you seven times more for your sins.
- 19 'I will also break down your pride of power; I will also make your sky like iron and your earth like bronze.
- 20 'Your strength will be spent uselessly, for your land will not yield its produce and the trees of the land will not yield their fruit.

31 It is a terrifying thing to fall into the hands of the living God.


- The word "Babylon" is found 164 times in the book of Jeremiah.
- Again and again Jeremiah warned the Jews that God's judgment was coming because of their sins, and that God would send the Babylonians to destroy their city and take them away as captives.
- The Jews did not like to think about Babylon but Jeremiah kept reminding them of the judgment that was coming.

Jer 20:4-5

- 4 I will give over all Judah to the hand of the king of Babylon, and he will carry them away as exiles to Babylon and will slay them with the sword.
- 5 'I will also give over all the wealth of this city, all its produce and all its costly things; even all the treasures of the kings of Judah I will give over to the hand of their enemies, and they will plunder them, take them away and bring them to Babylon.

Who was once great among the nations!

She who was a princess among the provinces Has become a forced laborer!

She weeps bitterly in the night

In the midst of distress.



Before the pursuer.


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- "feasts" referring to the 3 major annual feasts.

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- "gates" served 2 purposes: 1. Security. 2. Providing access to the city.

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- "feasts" referring to the 3 major annual feasts.
- "gates" served 2 purposes: 1. Security. 2. Providing access to the city.
- "groaning" they expressed their grief in groanings.
- "virgins"- those who sang and danced and brought music at the feasts.
- "bitter" מֵר mar bitter, angry.

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- The believers in Jerusalem are now slaves of their enemies.
- Babylon "fattens" its bank accounts from Jerusalem.
- Here is the first time the Lord is mentioned.
- These 2 lines really explain why this has happened:
 - 1. Grief is the result
 - 2. The Lord is the cause.
 - 3. Sin is the reason for the cause.
- Now think of the children in the hands of pagan Babylon. What if they were your children?

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"majesty" - her temple, her throne, and her priesthood.

- Like stags running away from hunters, leaving no one to defend the herd, so Judah's leaders had abandoned the nation as did King Zedekiah when he fled for his life during the siege of Jerusalem.
- They had been nearly starved to death for 2 years and so Zedekiah and the leaders fled, but not far.

- 7 In the days of her affliction and homelessness
- Jerusalem remembers all her precious things
- That were from the days of old,
- When her people fell into the hand of the adversary
- And no one helped her.
- The adversaries saw her,
- They mocked at her ruin.
- 8 Jerusalem sinned greatly,
- Therefore she has become an unclean thing.
- All who honored her despise her
- Because they have seen her nakedness;
- Even she herself groans and turns away.
- 9 Her uncleanness was in her skirts;
- She did not consider her future.
- Therefore she has fallen astonishingly;
- She has no comforter.
- "See, O Lord, my affliction,
- For the enemy has magnified himself!"

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- If the physical trauma was not enough, the believers in Jerusalem must also deal with the mental anguish as they remembered what once was hers.
- Her present state of ruin and ridicule is contrasted sharply with her former glory.
- After falling into enemy hands, she was laughed at.

Ps 137:1-3

- 1 By the rivers of Babylon,
- There we sat down and wept,
- When we remembered Zion.
- 2 Upon the willows in the midst of it
- We hung our harps.
- 3 For there our captors demanded of us songs,
- And our tormentors mirth, saying,
- "Sing us one of the songs of Zion."

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- "greatly" the sin of Jerusalem was no small thing.
- This was a campaign.
- God stripped this harlot of all He had provided for her and with nothing left, those who benefited off of her harlotry turned on her because she had nothing more to give them.

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- "See, O Lord, my affliction,
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- "uncleanness" a term usually used with sexual uncleanness. Here it is used as a metaphor. She is obscene in her appearance.
- Here is the deception of sin no consequences " live for today, everything is just fine, nothing to worry about."
- And then suddenly she falls unexpectedly.
- She cries for help, but no one helps.

"The nature of sin is such that, whether or not others discover your sin, your sin will "discover you." You cannot run from the consequences. Sin carries within itself the power to pay the sinner back, and sin's payback is hell. Don't even think about toying with sin. It cannot be tamed, outrun, or shaken off. No matter how safe you think you are, if you are a sinner, your sin will find you out."
