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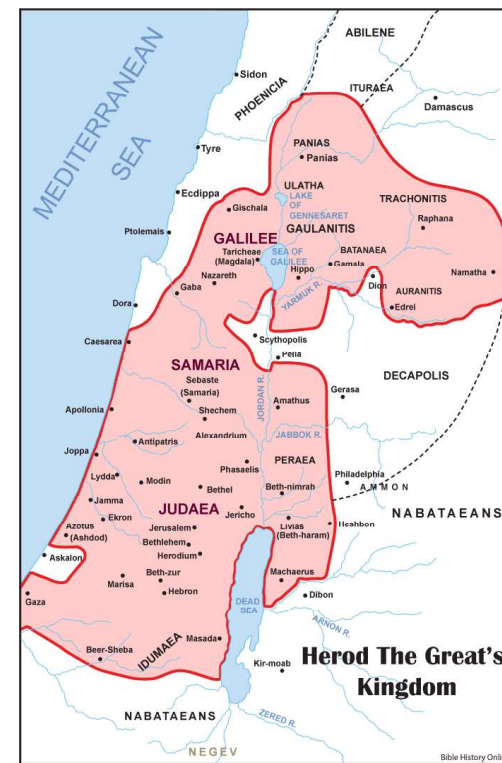
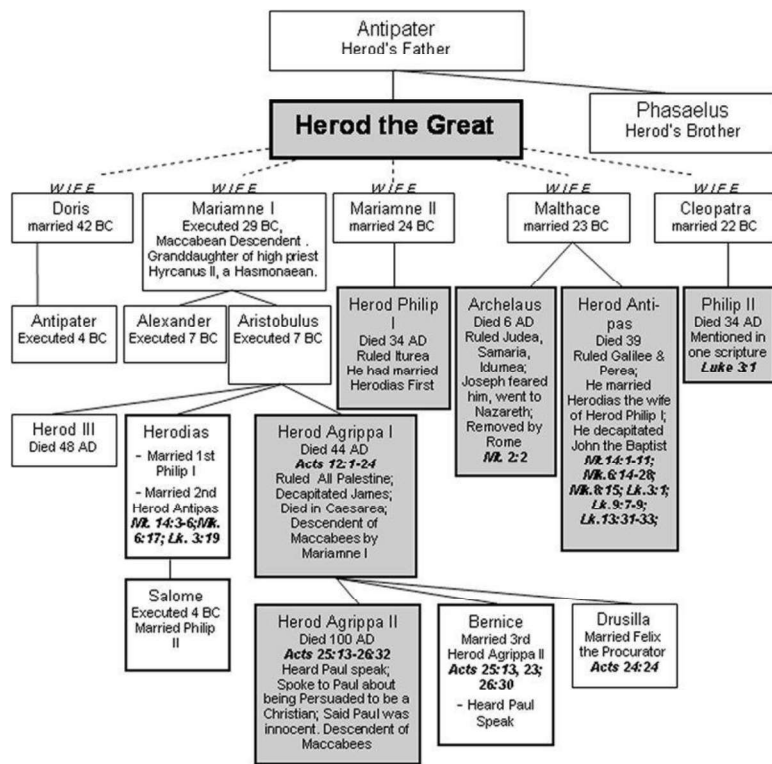
"A Conception Announcement"

Luke 1:5-20

May 2, 2021

5 In the days of Herod, king of Judea, there was a priest named Zacharias, of the division of Abijah; and he had a wife from the daughters of Aaron, and her name was Elizabeth.

- Luke begins the furthest back of the gospels.
- **Herod** (part of Herodian dynasty)
 1. **Herod the Great** (ruled 37-4 B.C.) – father, Gentile (Edomites - the descendants of Esau and enemies of Israel.), married Jewish woman to be accepted by Jews) building projects (Temple, cities), tried to trick the wisemen, killed all male babies under 2 in Bethlehem, killed wife and sons, egomaniac, paranoid, ruthless, a tyrant. Jews hated him.
 2. **Herod Archelaus** (ruled 4 B.C.-A.D. 6) – son, received one-half of his father's territory, the area surrounding and near Jerusalem (Judea and Samaria), replaced by Pontius Pilate, like father.
 3. **Herod Antipas** (ruled 4 B.C.-A.D. 39) – son, received a quarter of his father's territory (Galilee and Perea), "fox",
 4. **Herod Philip the Tetrarch** (ruled 4 B.C.-A.D. 34) – son, received the remaining quarter of the territory (north and east of Galilee—mostly ruled over Syrians and Greeks), like father.
 5. **Herod Agrippa I** (ruled A.D. 37-44) - Grandson of Herod the Great, ruled more territory than grandfather, put Peter in prison, like his grandfather.
 6. **Herod Agrippa II** (ruled A.D. 50s until long after the end of the Jewish war; died around A.D. 93) – final Herod, great grandson, ruled over large territory, he and Festus interviewed Paul (Acts 26), like his great grandfather.



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- This is a difficult time, if you are a believer, under Herod the Great.
- **Zacharias** – priest (from Aaron). Nothing special, just 1 of 20,000 priests. God uses ordinary people.
- **Abijah** – 8th group/division of 24 groups. (1 Chron. 24) Divided to share the responsibilities of the priesthood.
- **Elizabeth** – daughter of a priest. (from the line of priests coming from Aaron).
- A priest could marry only a woman of absolutely pure Jewish lineage.
- All male offspring would be priests.

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- Why? – Elizabeth was barren, unable to conceive. Like Sarah, Rebekah, Rachel, & Samson's mother.
- In Jewish culture, having no children meant the parents were to blame – God was punishing them. It was a great burden a woman would carry.
- The rabbis used to say there were seven people are excommunicated from God. Top of the list: A Jew who has no wife, or a Jew whose wife has no child.
- Being barren was grounds for divorce. Wife was cursed by God.
- On top of that they were old – 60 +, maybe 70's or 80's. Oldest recorded woman in history to have baby – in Romania at 66.
- Having no children was a problem financially when they would get old – no one to support them.
- So this was not divine punishment but divine planning.

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- They lived quiet godly lives.

“righteous” – because of their obedience it was counted to them as righteousness.

Isa 61:10

10 I will rejoice greatly in the Lord,

My soul will exult in my God;

For He has clothed me with garments of salvation,

He has wrapped me with a robe of righteousness,

“walking” – participle – shows why they were righteous.

“blameless” – not that they were sinless, but they dealt with their sin in short order – brought sacrifices. Followed the Mosaic Law (for sanctification not justification).

“had no child” – they were godly but had no children.

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- Zacharias is going about doing his job, carrying out his service. Nothing unusual.

“appointed order” – twice a year (1 week each time) each group/division would go up to the temple in Jerusalem to serve in the Temple area – slaughtering of animals, etc. Also would serve at the 3 feasts each year.

- Because there were so many priests, those chosen to actually go into the Temple and serve with incense was a very high privilege. You could only do it once in your lifetime.
- The way you were chosen was by casting lots. About 50 were chosen to perform all kinds of services. 3 went into the Holy Place.
- Zacharias won the **“lot-tery”**. He was chosen to serve in the highest manner of service – to burn incense. Offerings occurred twice a day – AM and PM, This was probably 3 PM. The burning of incense was the offering of prayers ascending to God. Next to the veil.
- So suddenly Zacharias’ life takes a sharp turn under the providence of God.

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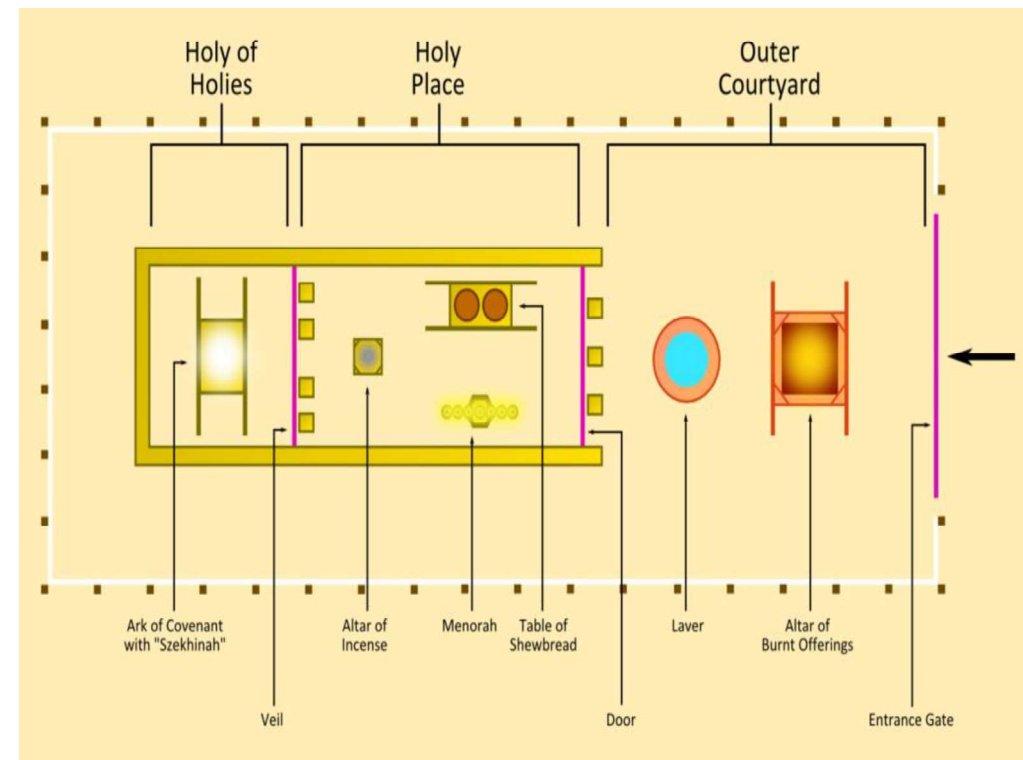
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- Gong would be sounded by the priests, summoning the people to worship, singing and prayer.
- When the people outside saw the two men exit the temple, they knew that the time to offer the incense had come. A hush would fall on the crowd.
- As the people were praying on the outside, Zacharias was sprinkling the incense on the altar on the inside and offering as prayer – for the salvation of Israel, for the coming of the Messiah, needs of the nation.
- Unexpectedly, another right turn, another zag of the zig-zag.
- An angel appears to the right of the altar. Must have thought - “Does this happen to every priest? No one told me about this.”
- **Note:** Great things happen when you are serving the Lord.

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Fear possibly from:

1. A sudden appearance.
2. An angelic being.
3. Possible judgment.
