Matt 1:18-25

- 18 Now the birth of Jesus Christ was as follows: when His mother Mary had been betrothed to Joseph, before they came together she was found to be with child by the Holy Spirit.
- 19 And Joseph her husband, being a righteous man and not wanting to disgrace her, planned to send her away secretly.

For the Jews there are 3 legitimate biblical reasons for divorce –

- 1. *Incest* (Lev. 18, 20) "marriage to a family member"
- 2. *Idolatry* (Ezra 10) "marriage to a worshipper of idols"
- 3. **Adultery** (Matt. 1:19) "marriage (betrothed) to a non-virgin"

Matt 1:18-25

- 18 Now the birth of Jesus Christ was as follows: when His mother Mary had been betrothed to Joseph, before they came together she was found to be with child by the Holy Spirit.
- 19 And Joseph her husband, being a righteous man and not wanting to disgrace her, planned to send her away secretly.
- 20 But when he had considered this, behold, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream, saying, "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife; for the Child who has been conceived in her is of the Holy Spirit.
- 21 "She will bear a Son; and you shall call His name Jesus, for He will save His people from their sins."
- 22 Now all this took place to fulfill what was spoken by the Lord through the prophet:
- 23 "BEHOLD, THE VIRGIN SHALL BE WITH CHILD AND SHALL BEAR A SON, AND THEY SHALL CALL HIS NAME IMMANUEL," which translated means, "GOD WITH US."
- 24 And Joseph awoke from his sleep and did as the angel of the Lord commanded him, and took Mary as his wife,
- 25 but kept her a virgin until she gave birth to a Son; and he called His name Jesus.

- 4 Joseph also went up from Galilee, from the city of Nazareth, to Judea, to the city of David which is called Bethlehem, because he was of the house and family of David,

- Joseph was born in Bethlehem as David was.


Ruth 2:4

- 2. They were in a legal relationship.
- 3. Mary was pregnant.

• Mary is in the final stage.

- 2. The fulness of time was complete.



"Where you would have expected angels, there were only flies. Where you would have expected heads of state, there were only donkeys, a few haltered cows, some sheep, a tethered camel, & a furtive scurry of curious mice. Except for Joseph, there was no one to share Mary's pain. Or her joy. Yes, there were angels announcing the Savior's arrival – but only to a band of blue-collar shepherds. And yes, a magnificent star shone in the sky to mark his birthplace – but only 3 foreigners bothered to look up & follow it." Thus, in the little town of Bethlehem...that one silent night...the royal birth of God's Son tiptoed quietly by...as the world slept!"

"If we imagine that Jesus was born in a freshly swept, county fair stable, we miss the whole point. It was wretched—scandalous! There was sweat and pain and blood and cries as Mary reached up to the heavens for help. The earth was cold and hard. Carnival atmosphere. The church thought, "Let's sanctify this celebration by imposing the birth of Christ on the same day." Bad idea.

*Whether you choose to celebrate the traditions of the Christmas season, is up to you.


Rom 14:5-6
