

"Choosing World-Changers"

Luke 6:12-16

March 13, 2022

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- 13 And when day came, He called His disciples to Him and chose twelve of them, whom He also named as apostles:
- 14 Simon, whom He also named Peter, and Andrew his brother; and James and John; and Philip and Bartholomew;
- 15 and Matthew and Thomas; James the son of Alphaeus, and Simon who was called the Zealot;
- 16 Judas the son of James, and Judas Iscariot, who became a traitor.

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"at this time" – right after last confrontation with Pharisees. Things are getting tense. Time to put a succession plan in place.

- Where do you start? Prayer.
- This is a monumental decision.
- Note: This is the only example of Jesus doing an all-night prayer session.
- He chooses a secluded place a mountain. NW shores of the Sea of Galilee.
- Jesus is seeking the Father's will concerning who will succeed Him.

John 5:30

30 "I can do nothing on My own initiative. As I hear, I judge; and My judgment is just, because I do not seek My own will, but the will of Him who sent Me."

"Jesus was about to make a momentous decision, one that would affect the future of the world, but first He must spend time talking it over with God. Luke emphasizes here the essential humanity of the Lord Jesus. Consequently, he emphasizes the Lord's habits of prayer. All too often we

make decisions and blunder into distressing situations simply because we fail to pray earnestly enough about them. Jesus never made that mistake. "

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- In the incarnation, Jesus set aside or gave up the independent use of His divine attributes so that He might depend upon God as His Father in all things. This is showing us His humanity.
- **Options:** angels, voice from heaven, other.
- He could not use books, video recordings, Facebook, Twitter, texting, the internet, emails, voicemails, radio, or TV to get the message out.
- That leaves people.
- But who and how do you find them? No Zip Recruiter available. No applications, no interviews. No seminaries, Bible schools or colleges, no Christian organizations, and no large groups of believers. Israel is apostate and opposing Him.

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- Jesus had a larger number of disciples following Him than just the 12.

"disciple" – a learner. Nothing more. "Teachable attitude" No authority. Could be a believer or an unbeliever. You just follow someone to learn. Rabbi's had disciples.

"They have no occupation, they have given up the pursuits in which they were engaged: their fishing, their tax gathering, and their agriculture. They carry on no business; they simply walk around and behind their leader, talking to each other or to Him, and when He speaks to the people who begin to gather, they listen just like everybody else. The only thing they do is go with Him from place to place." - Herbert Lockyer

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"apostle" – one who is sent. Ambassador, delegate, messenger, sent to accomplish a job. Had authority of the sender. Was looked on as if the sender was the one doing it. (there were other apostles that were not a part of the original 12 - Paul, Barnabas, Epaphroditus, Andonicus, Junia[s])

"Win – Build – Send"

"chose twelve" – matched the OT number of Israel's 12 tribes. These then were to take the place of the 12 tribes (Israel) who had failed to bring the message of salvation to the world. But this is not "replacement theology."

"chose" - God does the choosing.

John 15:16

16 "You did not choose Me but I chose you, and appointed you that you would go and bear fruit,

• The same is true of us as believers – we chose Him because He <u>first</u> chose us.

"By constantly spending intimate time with Jesus (for 3 years with God incarnate!), the Twelve would be personally mentored by the Messiah Himself. They would be trained as His apprentices. These twelve men would be responsible for the spread of the gospel and the establishment of sound doctrine, laying the foundation of the church (Eph. 2:20). For the remainder of His earthly ministry, Jesus intensely invested Himself in preparing them."

7 observations of those Jesus chose:

- 1. Different backgrounds 4 fishermen, a tax collector, maybe some farmers, or craftsmen.
- 2. Different temperament types.
- 3. Not the wealthy, the influential, the powerful, the educated, or the famous.
- 4. Represented the human race in diversity.
- These, from the worlds perspective, were nobodies, like Mary and Joseph, Anna and Simeon, Elizabeth and Zacharias, John the Baptist.
- 6. They were ordinary men chosen to do extraordinary tasks.
- 7. These were men who had a heart for God and a teachable attitude. They all gave their lives to follow Christ.

- Simon Peter fisherman/leader/impulsive/bold/asks a million questions/eager/hypocritical.
- Andrew fisherman/brother of Peter/ brings people to Christ including Peter/humble/gentle.
- James fisherman/cousin of Jesus/one of the "sons of thunder" (fiery temperament)/first to be martyred/insensitive/passionate/wrote the book of James.
- John fisherman/cousin of Jesus/one of the "sons of thunder" (fiery temperament) /wrote a gospel, 3 NT letters, and book of Revelation/"the beloved disciple"/sensitive/only disciple who was not martyred.

Philip – analytical/pessimistic/unsure.

- Bartholomew also known as Nathaniel/honest/open.
- Matthew tax collector/walked away from the "love of money"/worked for Rome/wrote a gospel/humble.

Thomas – skeptical/hesitant.

James the son of Alphaeus – no information.

Simon who was called the Zealot – tax hater/hated Rome/would have sought to kill someone like Matthew.

Judas the son of James – no information.

Judas Iscariot, who became a traitor – loved money/easily deceived.

There are many interesting connections with this group. There are brothers (James and John, Peter and Andrew); business associates (Peter, Andrew, James, and John were all fishermen); opposing political viewpoints (Matthew the Roman-friendly tax collector, and Simon, the Roman-hating Zealot); and one who would betray Jesus (Judas Iscariot who also became a traitor)." "Jesus builds his church from people of different temperaments and backgrounds. Jesus unites people who otherwise would be enemies. Jesus calls unexpected and unlikely people to carry out his mission. Jesus transforms people in the course of serving him. Jesus equips those he calls to serve him. Jesus brings out the best in those who serve with him. Jesus allows for false individuals among those who claim to serve him"
