- 9 And He began to tell the people this parable: "A man planted a vineyard and rented it out to vine-growers, and went on a journey for a long time.
- 10 "At the harvest time he sent a slave to the vine-growers, so that they would give him some of the produce of the vineyard; but the vine-growers beat him and sent him away empty-handed.
- 11 "And he proceeded to send another slave; and they beat him also and treated him shamefully and sent him away empty-handed.
- 12 "And he proceeded to send a third; and this one also they wounded and cast out.
- 13 "The owner of the vineyard said, 'What shall I do? I will send my beloved son; perhaps they will respect him.'
- 14 "But when the vine-growers saw him, they reasoned with one another, saying, 'This is the heir; let us kill him so that the inheritance will be ours.'
- 15 "So they threw him out of the vineyard and killed him. What, then, will the owner of the vineyard do to them?
- 16 "He will come and destroy these vine-growers and will give the vineyard to others." When they heard it, they said, "May it never be!"
- 17 But Jesus looked at them and said, "What then is this that is written:

THE STONE WHICH THE BUILDERS REJECTED.

THIS BECAME THE CHIEF CORNER stone'?

18 "Everyone who falls on that stone will be broken to pieces; but on whomever it falls, it will scatter him like dust."

- 9 And He began to tell the people this parable: "A man planted a vineyard and rented it out to vine-growers, and went on a journey for a long time.
- "parable" a tool used for teaching. A story, an illustration.
- Renting out land was not uncommon in the first century as it is not uncommon today. A contractual agreement would be set up.
- The absentee land owner was free to live elsewhere and to travel when and where he pleased.
- He must have complete trust in the vine-growers.
- Let's look at Is. 5:1-7 . . .

The Owner of the Vineyard = God the Father

The Vineyard = The nation of Israel

Vine-growers = The religious rulers of Israel entrusted with leading Israel - chief priests, scribes and Pharisees, and the elders.

Slaves = The prophets of God that were persecuted and killed.

Son = The Lord Jesus

Isa 5:1-7

1 Let me sing now for my well-beloved

A song of my beloved concerning His vineyard.

My well-beloved had a vineyard on a fertile hill.

2 He dug it all around, removed its stones,

And planted it with the choicest vine.

And He built a tower in the middle of it

And also hewed out a wine vat in it;

Then He expected it to produce good grapes,

But it produced only worthless ones.

3 "And now, O inhabitants of Jerusalem and men of Judah,

Judge between Me and My vineyard.

4 "What more was there to do for My vineyard that I have not done in it?

Why, when I expected it to produce good grapes did it produce worthless ones?

- 5 "So now let Me tell you what I am going to do to My vineyard: I will remove its hedge and it will be consumed; I will break down its wall and it will become trampled ground.
- 6 "I will lay it waste; it will not be pruned or hoed, But briars and thorns will come up. I will also charge the clouds to rain no rain on it."
- 7 For the vineyard of the Lord of hosts is the house of Israel

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- 13 "The owner of the vineyard said, 'What shall I do? I will send my beloved son; perhaps they will respect him.'
- 14 "But when the vine-growers saw him, they reasoned with one another, saying, 'This is the heir; let us kill him so that the inheritance will be ours.'
- 15 "So they threw him out of the vineyard and killed him. What, then, will the owner of the vineyard do to them?
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- 12 "And he proceeded to send a third; and this one also they wounded and cast out.
- The owner, at harvest, would like to collect on his investment so he sends a slave.
- But what would shock all those listening to the parable, was the response of the vine-growers who beat the slave.
- There was not only a refusal to pay what was due the owner, but the criminal act of an assault on the slave.
- Wow! Look what the owner does in response he sends another slave. No charges are brought.
- Same result they beat him. Now it is time for revenge, right?
- No. The owner sends a third slave who they wound and send away.
- There was great patience and grace displayed by the owner.
- 13 "The owner of the vineyard said, 'What shall I do? I will send my beloved son; perhaps they will respect him.'
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- The owner wonders what to do. What would you do?
 - "eve for an eve"
 - take him to court
 - fire the vine-growers and hire a new group.
- Vs. 13 The owner decides to send his son. More grace, more patience.
- Certainly they will respect the son.
- Vs. 14 They want the inheritance. Kill the son and the inheritance is theirs. They can be in control. They can have it all.
- Vs. 15 So they kill the son (premeditated murder). What can the owner do to us?
- **Vs. 16** Jesus lays it out exactly and definitely what will happen they will be destroyed (70 AD). Vineyard will go to others.
- They not only hear what Jesus is saying, they understand it " $\alpha \kappa o v$ "
- That is why they give a strange response, "No, no, and a thousand times no. This cannot happen. Israel can't be destroyed and replaced." They get it.
- They followed the line of reasoning from Israel's history and feared if the parable would be true, this could happen.

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- **The Owner of the Vineyard** = God the Father. He brought Israel into existence. He leaves the care of Israel to the leaders.
- **The Vineyard** = The nation of Israel. The chosen nation and people of God. God expects to receive spiritual fruit back from His ownership of Israel.
- Vine-growers = The religious rulers of Israel entrusted with leading Israel including chief priests, scribes and Pharisees, Sadducees, the Sanhedrin, and the elders. They fail time and time again.
- **Slaves** = The prophets of God that were sent to Israel were persecuted and killed by the religious rulers. The OT gives a detailed vivid description of God sending prophets time and time again to call Israel to produce spiritual fruit.

Jer 7:25-26

- 25 "Since the day that your fathers came out of the land of Egypt until this day, I have sent you all My servants the prophets, daily rising early and sending them.
- 26 "Yet they did not listen to Me or incline their ear, but stiffened their neck; they did more evil than their fathers.

Jer 25:4

4 "And the Lord has sent to you all His servants the prophets again and again, but you have not listened nor inclined your ear to hear,

Matt 23:37-38

- 37 "Jerusalem, Jerusalem, who kills the prophets and stones those who are sent to her! How often I wanted to gather your children together, the way a hen gathers her chicks under her wings, and you were unwilling.
- 38 "Behold, your house is being left to you desolate!
- **Son** = Finally God sends His Son, the Lord Jesus Christ, who will be mistreated and killed by Israel's leadership along with the Romans.

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
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
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- 18 "Everyone who falls on that stone will be broken to pieces; but on whomever the chief corner stone falls, it will scatter him like dust.
- The dead son is not the end of the story.
- He rises from the dead and becomes the "chief corner stone."
- What is a corner stone? It is the first and most important stone when erecting a building in the first century.
- Builders would reject stones until they found the perfect one for their building.









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- However here in this passage the religious builders are not looking for the perfect corner stone but at their own perfection achieved through selfrighteousness.
- They reject Jesus because He does not fit "their building." He is offensive to them and their man-made religious system.

Ps 118:22

22 The stone which the builders rejected Has become the chief corner stone.


- Vs. 18 You either reject the chief corner stone (stumble and fall on the stone) and are smashed, or the chief corner stone rejects you and you are crushed in judgment.
- "stumble" you just can't get around it. The religious leaders just kept stumbling – His humble birth, His ability to expose their system, His servanthood, His mission, etc.
- If this foundation-stone is not the means of your salvation, it will be the means of your ruin.

Eph 2:20

20 having been built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Christ Jesus Himself being the corner stone,

• So here is the Church. The Church is now the people of God who have temporarily replaced Israel.

16 "He will come and destroy these vine-growers and will give the vineyard to others." When they heard it, they said, "May it never be!"

"A STONE OF STUMBLING AND A ROCK OF OFFENSE";

for they stumble because they are disobedient to the word, and to this doom they were also appointed.
