

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Biblical View of Government and Its Leadership from 5 Scriptures

1. Dan 2:21

21 . . . He removes kings and establishes kings;

2. Prov 21:1

3.1 Tim 2:1-2

"In AD 67, Nero ordered the burning of Rome. The fire lasted for nine days and when the blame turned to Nero, Nero blamed the Christians. And Nero came at the Christians with a new vengeance. Nero contrived all manner of punishments for the Christians that the most infernal imagination could design. In particular, he had some sewed up in skins of wild beasts, and then they were attacked by dogs until they expired; and others dressed in shirts made stiff with wax, were fixed to stakes, and set on fire in his gardens, in order to illuminate them. This persecution was

general throughout the whole Roman Empire. In the course

of it, St. Paul and St. Peter were martyred."

"All through the OT God represents himself as the controlling force behind every government on earth, without exception. Therefore, it isn't man's elections or his revolutions that determine the governments of earth. We think it is. In Mexico they used to do it by the process of revolution -- you never could change the government there without a revolution. But neither elections nor revolutions determine who sits in the seats of power -- it is God Who does so. These things are only the instruments by which He works His will; and the revelation of Scripture is that God puts in power the men of his choosing, whether they be good or evil, whether they are beneficent rulers or tyrants like Hitler or Stalin or Mao or any of the others on earth by the permissive choice of God. If you struggle with that, it is because you don't see what is behind God's purpose in the world today & that He is El Elyon, the sovereign Most High God over ALL the earth. The questioning of why God allows evil comes because we do not realize that God is not attempting to govern the earth properly -- He is waiting, He is withholding, He is restraining evil, He is governing to a limited extent, -- but He is not trying to do the job as He will someday. We've not seen the end of "His"story ("HISTORY") yet!. Every government that exists is held in the palm of God's hand. It can only go as far as God wills; it is under His control; it has been instituted by Him. . . . Furthermore, God sometimes may, for His own purposes, place even wicked men in positions of power (Nebuchadnezzar Jer 27:5-7, Da 4:17). The Apostle Paul himself was imprisoned and finally executed by Emperor Nero, yet he never counseled rebellion or disobedience."

5. Rom 13:1-7

- 1 Every person is to be in subjection to the governing authorities. For there is no authority except from God, and those which exist are established by God.
- 2 Therefore whoever resists authority has opposed the ordinance of God; and they who have opposed will receive condemnation upon themselves.
- 3 For rulers are not a cause of fear for good behavior, but for evil. Do you want to have no fear of authority? Do what is good and you will have praise from the same;
- 4 for it is a minister of God to you for good. But if you do what is evil, be afraid; for it does not bear the sword for nothing; for it is a minister of God, an avenger who brings wrath on the one who practices evil.
- 5 Therefore it is necessary to be in subjection, not only because of wrath, but also for conscience' sake.
- 6 For because of this you also pay taxes, for rulers are servants of God, devoting themselves to this very thing.
- 7 Render to all what is due them: tax to whom tax is due; custom to whom custom; fear to whom fear; honor to whom honor.

Rev 13:3-7

3 And the whole earth was amazed and followed after the beast:

4 they worshiped the dragon because he gave his authority to the beast; and they worshiped the beast, saying, "Who is like the beast, and who is able to wage war with him?"

5 There was given to him a mouth speaking arrogant words and blasphemies, and authority to act for forty-two months was given to him.

6 And he opened his mouth in blasphemies against God, to blaspheme His name and His tabernacle, that is, those who dwell in heaven.

7 It was also given to him to make war with the saints and to overcome them, and authority over every tribe and people and tongue and nation was given to him.

"Human rulers are "God's servants." As such, they deserve four things from us: Taxes, revenue, respect, and honor. We may think we are heavily taxed (and we are), but hardly more so than in the first century. Rome had an income tax, a head tax, a poll tax, a road tax, a wagon tax, a crop tax, an import tax, an export tax, a harbor tax, and a bridge tax--to name only a few. The Caesars like to live in style and it cost a lot of money to maintain that huge empire, so they taxed their people heavily in order to pay for everything. Paying taxes is a Christian duty. Tax evasion is not only a crime; it's also a sin."

*Note: The Roman historian Tacitus noted that in the A.D. 58 there were persistent complaints against taxes.

1 Peter 2:13-15

- 13 Submit yourselves for the Lord's sake to every human institution, whether to a king as the one in authority,
- 14 or to governors as sent by him for the punishment of evildoers and the praise of those who do right.
- 15 For such is the will of God that by doing right you may silence the ignorance of foolish men.

The exception to submission to the government in all things:

- 1. In Daniel's day, Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego refused to worship the king's golden image, and were cast into the fiery furnace.
- 2. God's people were ordered not to pray to their God. Daniel, in violation of the law, worshipped the Lord God, refused to obey the king's decree, and for that was thrown into the lion's den.
- 3. In the Book of Acts we are told that believers were ordered not to teach the people in the name of Jesus. "Peter and the other apostles answered and said: We ought to obey God rather than men" (Acts 5:29).

*We disobey the government when God's Word tells us to do something and the government forbids us, or when the government tells us to do something and God's Word forbids us.

"On one level, the answer is clear. You can go as far as the law allows you to go. You can picket, you can collect petitions, you can write letters to the editor, you can call a talk-show and sound off, you can vote and encourage others to vote with you, you can visit your congresswoman or your senator. You can take out an ad in the paper if you like. Submission doesn't require you to keep your mouth shut about injustice and corruption. However, the issue of the heart is very important. It's better to keep quiet than to speak out in burning anger. If you believe that God can work his will even through a corrupt leader, that will temper your comments, cool your emotions, and keep you from doing or saying something you may regret later."

"Our conclusion is this: A Christian must disobey his government when it asks him to 1) violate a commandment of God, 2) commit an immoral or unethical act, or 3) go against his Christian conscience (a conscience which is informed by Scripture and is in submission to the Spirit of God)."

"The principle is clear: We are to submit right up to the point where obedience to the state would entail disobedience to God. But if the state commands what God forbids, or forbids what God commands, then our plain Christian duty is to resist, not to submit, to disobey the state in order to obey God."

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Luke 23:2

- 2 And they began to accuse Him, saying, "We found this man misleading our nation and forbidding to pay taxes to Caesar, and saying that He Himself is Christ, a King."
- They never have been able to pin anything on Jesus nor will they ever be able to do so.
- They are so amazed, that they become silent.

Application

- 1. Don't ever think anyone can prove Jesus is untruthful in what He says in His Word. The GWTJ will not be the place to prove your point.
- 2. Government is an important and greatly needed institution in the world. It has its place in the believer's life, but just not one of prominence.
- 3. No government, not 1 of the 195, ever saved 1 person from hell. No President, no Prime Minister, no Supreme Leader, and no politician will ever be the Savior of mankind. If the Church is going to play that game of idolatry, it will bring the wrath of God upon itself.
- 4. The believer has to learn from the Scriptures what part government will play in their lives. Believers need a biblical view of government.
- 5. God demands and deserves far more from us than the government.
