- They had already decided the verdict – guilty, and the punishment – death.

- This then was made a capital trial by the Jews – punishable by death.
- This is the first physical beating of Jesus to take place.

Trial #1

John 18:12-13

12 So the Roman cohort and the commander and the officers of the Jews, arrested Jesus and bound Him,

13 and led Him to **Annas** first; for he was father-in-law of Caiaphas,

Trial #2

Matt 26:57

57 Those who had seized Jesus led Him away to **Caiaphas**, the high priest, where the scribes and the elders were gathered together.

Trial #3

Matt 27:1

1 Now when morning came, all the **chief priests and the elders** of the people conferred together against Jesus to put Him to death;

Trial #4

John 18:28-29

28 Then they led Jesus from Caiaphas into the Praetorium, and it was early; and they themselves did not enter into the Praetorium so that they would not be defiled, but might eat the Passover.

29 Therefore **Pilate** went out to them

Trial #5

Luke 23:6-7

6 When Pilate heard it, he asked whether the man was a Galilean.

7 And when he learned that He belonged to Herod's jurisdiction, he sent Him to **Herod**, who himself also was in Jerusalem at that time.

Trial #6

Luke 23:11

11 And Herod with his soldiers, after treating Him with contempt and mocking Him, dressed Him in a gorgeous robe and sent Him back to **Pilate**.

The rules for a Jewish trial had 3 distinct purposes: 1. It was to be a public trial open to all. 2. There was to be a defense for the accused. 3. There needed to be at least two or three true witnesses for conviction.

The entire trial of Jesus was illegal:

- **Bribery** – Judas, 2 witnesses.
- **Illegal Timing (of the trial)** - night
- **Illegal Location (of the trial)** - house
- **Lack of a Charge** – no charge
- **Lack of Defense** – no friend of Jesus was in court.
- **Lack of Evidence** – 0 evidence.
- **Abuse** – not allowed to assault the accused.
- **False Witnesses** – Jews brought 2 false witnesses.
- **Improper Prosecution** – witnesses must bring charges not Sanhedrin.
- **Forced Self-Incrimination** – the accused cannot self-incriminate.
- **Blasphemy** – Jesus could not be charged with a religious offence.
- **Ignoring the Evidence** – 0 evidence was provided.
- **Faulty Verdict** – was decided before the trial.
- **Hasty Sentence** – cannot carry out punishment on the same day of trial.
- **Murder** – with no evidence, this was flat out murder.

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i. According to Jewish law, all criminal trials must begin and end in the daylight. This second trial was necessary because they knew the first one – the real trial – had no legal standing.

ii. According to Jewish law, only decisions made in the official meeting place were valid. The first trial was held at the home of Caiaphas, the high priest, so they called together this trial, held at their council.

iii. According to Jewish law, criminal cases could not be tried during the Passover season.

iv. According to Jewish law, only an acquittal could be issued on the day of the trial; guilty verdicts had to wait one night to allow for feelings of mercy to rise.

v. According to Jewish law, all evidence had to be guaranteed by two witnesses, who were separately examined and could not have contact with each other.

vi. According to Jewish law, false witness was punishable by death; nothing is done to the many false witnesses in Jesus' trial.

vii. According to Jewish law, a trial always began by bringing forth evidence for the innocence of the accused before the evidence of guilt was offered; this was not the practice here.

- In reality. They have no idea what they are doing.

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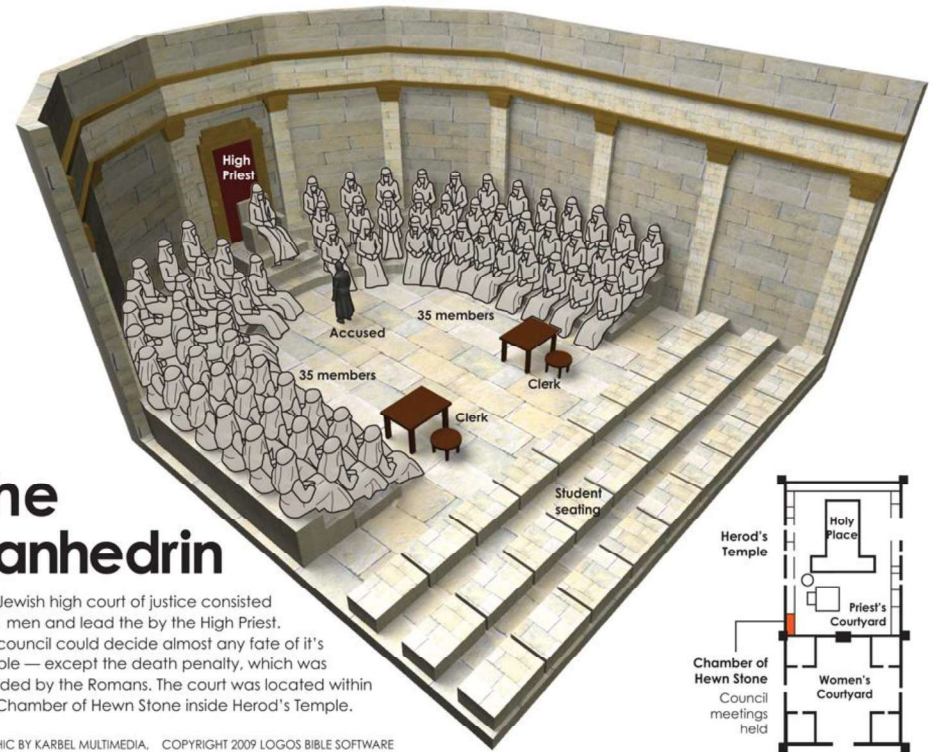
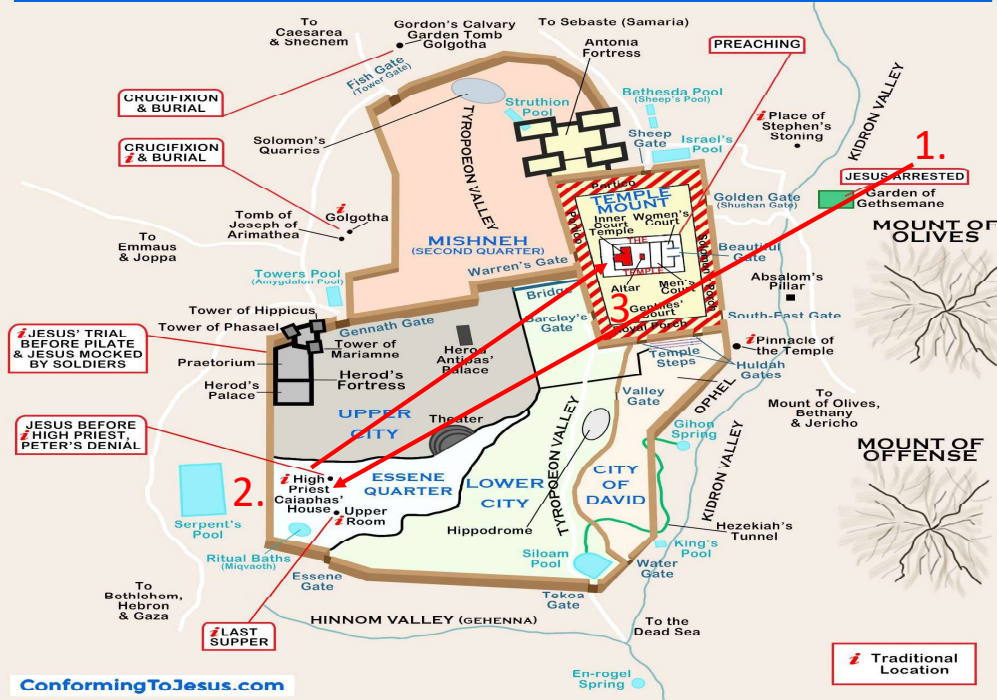
Blaspheming - βλασφημιο – speaking insults, and slander to revile and defame Jesus.

The Sanhedrin

The Jewish high court of justice consisted of 71 men and led by the High Priest. The council could decide almost any fate of its people — except the death penalty, which was decided by the Romans. The court was located within the Chamber of Hewn Stone inside Herod's Temple.

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- Jews are calling for self-incrimination here, which was illegal.
- "If . . ." and it is true that this is what you claim. 1st class conditional "if".
- Jesus knows this whole thing is a farce.
- The Jews are not looking for the truth.
- This is not a real trial.
- By these answers Jesus is exposing who they are and what they are doing.

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- "You Jews need to think about this . . ."
 1. I will be seated at God's right hand.
 2. This is where the power of God resides.
 2. This is the power to judge and condemn. You better be right.
- That should have at least caused them to pause when they heard this.

70 And they all said, "Are You the Son of God, then?" And He said to them, "Yes, I am."

- But no pause here. They are going for the juggler.
- There is no clearer statement in Scripture that Jesus is the Son of God, thus making Him God.
- For the Jews, this is the million dollar question.
- They get a "yes" here, and it is over. We've got Him.
- Jesus lays it right out there for them.

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- They needed no more proof.
- No further questions. We rest our case.
- It is time to now go to the Romans and convince them that He is a threat to Caesar. Get a verdict. Commit murder.

Application

1. All of the hatred, mocking, and perversion of who Jesus is originates from the pit of hell.
2. Man-made religion, under the appearance of those who are "God worshippers" and "Bible followers", can be the greatest antagonists against the truth.
