

Month of Nissan 1 st month of Hebrew Calendar. (Exodus 12:2) (March/April)

9 Jesus arrived in Bethany yesterday (Saturday), and on Sunday the crowds visit Jesus and Lazarus in Bethany which upsets the Jewish leaders (John 12:9-20).	10 Select the Lamb. Exodus 12:3 - "On the tenth of this month they are each one to take a lamb for the lamb of God." Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem on the tenth of the month (Sunday). Lazarus' conversion with Greeks (John 12:20-36).	11 Jesus curses the Fig tree (judging judgment re: Israel) again (Mark 11:13). Jesus touches all day in the Temple grounds. (northern Israel)	12 Withered fig tree is seen again (Mark 11:13). Jesus sends Peter and John to prepare for the Passover meal. Note: New Testament note: this is the first Passover after Jesus' resurrection.	13 Early am arrest of Jesus by the Sanhedrin. Jesus is taken to the High Priest Caiaphas. Jesus is beaten and spat upon. Jesus is taken to the Praetorium (Pilate's house).	14 Jesus is tried before Pilate. Pilate washes his hands and says, "I am innocent of this man's blood. You bear it yourselves." Jesus is sent to Herod Antipas.	15 Jesus is sent back to Pilate. Pilate asks Jesus if he is the King of the Jews. Jesus replies, "My kingdom is not of this world."
16 Jesus is condemned to death by Pilate and crucified on Golgotha (the skull) at Calvary. Jesus is buried in the tomb of Joseph of Arimathea.

• How did we get to this point?

1. Jesus and disciples in upper room in Jerusalem.
2. Judas revealed, and leaves the group to betray Jesus.
3. Jesus and 11 leave Jerusalem and head up the Mount of Olives to the Garden of Gethsemane.
4. Prayer in the Garden.
5. Judas and 1,000+ come to the Garden to arrest Jesus.
6. Jesus arrested shortly after midnight, brought to Annas and then to Caiaphas, the chief priest, and then between 1:00 – 5:00 AM three illegal Jewish trials are held. All 3 Jewish trials were crooked, quickly pushed through, and violated the laws of a just Jewish trial.

Mark 14:55-60

5 Now the chief priests and the whole Council kept trying to obtain testimony against Jesus to put Him to death, and they were not finding any.

56 For many were giving false testimony against Him, but their testimony was not consistent.

57 Some stood up and began to give false testimony against Him, saying,

58 "We heard Him say, 'I will destroy this temple made with hands, and in three days I will build another made without hands.'"

59 Not even in this respect was their testimony consistent.

1 Then the whole body of them got up and brought Him before Pilate.

“whole body of them” – the 70 members of the Sanhedrin.

- We are at around 5:00 in the morning.

How did we get to this point?

1. Jesus and disciples in upper room in Jerusalem.
2. Judas revealed, and leaves the group to betray Jesus.
3. Jesus and 11 leave Jerusalem and head up the Mount of Olives to the Garden of Gethsemane.
4. Prayer in the Garden.
5. Judas and 1,000 + come to the Garden to arrest Jesus.
6. Jesus arrested shortly after midnight, brought to Annas and then to Caiaphas, the chief priest, and then between 1:00 – 5:00 AM three illegal Jewish trials are held. All 3 Jewish trials were crooked, quickly pushed through, and violated the laws of a just trial.
7. The purpose of the trials is to find Jesus guilty and put Him to death.
8. Peter denies knowing Christ 3 times.
9. The third trial by Jewish leaders extracts from Jesus the blasphemous statement they wanted out of Jesus and can now seek His death.
10. Judas realizes what he has done and ends his life.

Matt 27:1-5

- 1 Now when morning came, all the chief priests and the elders of the people conferred together against Jesus to put Him to death;
- 2 and they bound Him, and led Him away and delivered Him to Pilate the governor.

- 3 Then when Judas, who had betrayed Him, saw that He had been condemned, he felt remorse and returned the thirty pieces of silver to the chief priests and elders,

4 saying, "I have sinned by betraying innocent blood." But they said, "What is that to us? See to that yourself!"

- 5 And he threw the pieces of silver into the temple sanctuary and departed; and he went away and hanged himself.

Acts 1:16-18

16 "Brethren, the Scripture had to be fulfilled, which the Holy Spirit foretold by the mouth of David concerning Judas, who became a guide to those who arrested Jesus.

17 "For he was counted among us and received his share in this ministry."

18 (Now this man acquired a field with the price of his wickedness, and falling headlong, he burst open in the middle and all his intestines gushed out.

1 Then the whole body of them got up and brought Him before Pilate.

- **Pilate** – Pontius Pilate was the Roman governor of Judea from A.D. 26-36, serving under Emperor Tiberius. His position as governor included being judge as well.
 - Pilate had previously 3 major run-ins with the Jews, all involving his hanging images of the emperor all over Jerusalem and coins minted with Roman images on them.
 - Because of these incidents, he was nearly replaced and had to back down lest he lose his position and his job.

- The Jews bring 3 accusations before Pilate concerning Jesus:
 1. Misleading our nation.
 2. Forbidding to pay taxes to Caesar.
 3. Jesus claims to be a King.

Lies! Lies! Lies!

- The 3 trials of the Jews produced nothing which Rome would condemn Jesus over. They must come up with something else. They wanted to paint Him as a “insurrectionist.”
- 1. Misleading our nation. Maybe that could end in trouble for Rome. Very General. No evidence.
- 2. Forbidding to pay taxes.

Matt 22:19-21

19 "Show Me the coin used for the poll-tax." And they brought Him a denarius.

20 And He said to them, "Whose likeness and inscription is this?"

21 They said to Him, "Caesar's." Then He said to them, "Then render to Caesar the things that are Caesar's; and to God the things that are God's."

John 18:36

36 Jesus answered, "My kingdom is not of this world. If My kingdom were of this world, then My servants would be fighting so that I would not be handed over to the Jews; but as it is, My kingdom is not of this realm.

John 18:28-32

28 Then they led Jesus from Caiaphas into the Praetorium, and it was early; and they themselves did not enter into the Praetorium so that they would not be defiled, but might eat the Passover.

29 Therefore Pilate went out to them and said, "What accusation do you bring against this Man?"

30 They answered and said to him, "If this Man were an evildoer, we would not have delivered Him to you."

31 So Pilate said to them, "Take Him yourselves, and judge Him according to your law." The Jews said to him, "We are not permitted to put anyone to death,

32 to fulfill the word of Jesus which He spoke, signifying by what kind of death He was about to die.

• The chief priests and the crowds are all waiting outside of the praetorium.

• On all 3 counts, Pilate finds no guilt because there is no evidence.

• They keep the pressure on Pilate.

• The Jews now show the geographical breadth of Jesus' influence.

• "You need to stop this thing now", they are saying.

- Pilate needs a way out of this mess.
 - He knows if he kills Jesus, he has killed an innocent man. If he does not kill Jesus, he will lose his position and job.
 - "Maybe, just maybe there is a way out. . . . Did you say Galilee?"
- 7 And when he learned that He belonged to Herod's jurisdiction, he sent Him to Herod, who himself also was in Jerusalem at that time.**

- Jesus has now become a "hot potato" and it is time to pass Him on.
 - **Note:** The providence of God has Herod in Jerusalem as a further testimony to the innocence of Jesus.
 - Pilate now thinks he can wash his hands of the whole thing.

Application

1. The great question that the world faces, now and always, is, "Who is Jesus?" That question demands an answer from every living soul that has lived, is living, and will live here on planet earth.
2. If you do not answer that question with the truth, you must fabricate lies to escape who He really is.
3. The evidence is there, but a hard heart will only ignore it and move on. Evidence does demand a verdict.
4. At the Great White Throne Judgment unbelievers will know the truth but it will be too late. What remains is the degree of punishment from the books opened.
